PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS)

Tom Percich, Accreditation Manager for the St. Charles County Police Department, introduced Dr. Joseph Schafer, a Commissioner for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). Dr. Schafer recognized the St. Charles County Police Department for their efforts to achieve advanced accreditation, for their voluntary commitment to the rigorous professional standards of CALEA that provide for excellence in public safety and policing. Dr. Schafer stated the CALEA Commissioners unanimously approved the re-accreditation, congratulated Chief Frisz and his staff and presented the Advanced Accreditation Certificate to Chief Frisz and Percich.

Chief Kurt Frisz, thanked Tom Percich for his dedication and hard work in keeping all police policies up to date and ensuring the Police Department was compliant in order to achieve this award.

BILLS FOR INTRODUCTION)

Bill No. 5073 - Sponsored by Joe Cronin - AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT CUP22-04(A) FOR AN OUTDOOR STORAGE LOT FOR AUTOMOBILES, BOATS, TRAILERS, AND RECREATIONAL VEHICLES TO LAKE ST. LOUIS BOAT & RV STORAGE LLC, PROPERTY OWNER(S), AND BEN MOLITER, APPLICANT

Robert Myers, Planning and Zoning Division Director, was sworn in and explained that he would address three related bills for different conditional uses on the same property with one presentation, yet each bill could be approved or denied individually. Myers explained the property at 215 Josephville Rd. was zoned light industrial, located east of the GM plant, without sewer service, and historically prone to outdoor uses like a golfing range. Myers stated the first request is for storage of boats, autos and RVs, the second request is for heavy equipment storage and the third request is for a contracting and landscaping service. Myers stated a public hearing was held at the Planning and Zoning meeting on May 18, 2022, with one speaker in support and one letter of support from City of Wentzville with conditions of lighting, landscape screening and paved surfaces. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended unanimously that the Council approve the 3 requests.

Mark Struckhoff, with Bax Engineering and representing the applicant, was sworn in and explained that the equipment stored at the site would include mini-excavators, skid steers, small rubber tire bobcats, and directional drillers– not dump trucks or bulldozers. Struckhoff explained the landscape company equipment would be related to maintaining lawns. Struckhoff noted the requested uses fit with the County's 2030 land use plan.

Councilman Cronin stated he thought the property was a perfect site for the proposed uses and a good fit for the County.

Councilwoman Schneider questioned if the applicant was prepared to follow all conditions within the permits to which Struckhoff replied "yes".

Councilwoman Schneider opened the floor for public comment.

Arnie Dienoff, O'Fallon resident, was sworn in and stated the site was highly sought after and would not be the best use of the property as it doesn't bring in much revenue for the County. If approved, Dienoff requested that conditions be in place to protect citizens including a landscape buffer, fencing, no derelict vehicles or chemicals stored on the property or residents living on the premises. Dienoff raised concerns about security and access.

Struckhoff responded the property would be buffered, fenced and secured by gates at a single entrance.

Ben Moliter, applicant, was sworn in by County staff and stated he had plans to install multiple security cameras and all users would have a key-pad code for entry.

Council Chair Schneider called for any discussion or public comment:

Arnie Dienoff, O’Fallon resident, stated the site was highly sought after and would not be the best use of the property as it doesn’t bring in much revenue for the County. If approved, Deinoff requested that conditions be in place to protect citizens including a landscape buffer, fencing, no derelict vehicles or chemicals stored on the property or residents living on the premises. Bill No. 5075 - Sponsored by Joe Cronin - AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT CUP22-04(C) FOR A LANDSCAPING CONTRACTING SERVICE TO LAKE ST. LOUIS BOAT & RV STORAGE LLC, PROPERTY OWNER(S), AND BEN MOLITER, APPLICANT

Council Chair Schneider called for any discussion or public comment:

Arnie Dienoff, O’Fallon resident, stated the site was highly sought after and would not be the best use of the property as it doesn’t bring in much revenue for the County. If approved, Deinoff requested that conditions be in place to protect citizens including a landscape buffer, fencing, no derelict vehicles or chemicals stored on the property or residents living on the premises. Dienoff raised concerns about security and access.

With no further speaker Council Chair Schneider concluded public comment for the conditional use requests.

PUBLIC COMMENTS)

Council Chair Schneider opened the floor for Public Comments allowing speakers 3 minutes, with alternating pro and con views on each topic for a total of six speakers per topic.

Bill No. 5069

Brenda Webb – St. Charles County resident, stated the US Government is not in sync with what Americans care about and the same is happening in St. Charles County. Webb shared her concern that Bill No. 5069 cedes too much power to the St. Louis County Police Chief.

Jennifer Barker, Lake St. Louis resident, thanked Chief Kurt Frisz for his service to county residents, thanked him for amending Bill No. 5069 to remove the fusion center articles. Barker shared her concerns that Bill No. 5069 gives the Executive, not the Council control of the agreement, is worried about who could terminate the agreement, questioned high spending on the consent agenda, and asked the Council and Executive to address outstanding election issues.

Bill No. 5078

Tim Baker, Weldon Spring resident, requested the Council support Bill No. 5078 and thanked Councilman White for introducing the bill.

Bill No. 5076

Charlie Sapp, St. Charles County resident, stated his subdivision board is unanimously opposed to this rezoning due to increased noise and traffic. Sapp stated agricultural use is appropriate for this land and any future development could be controlled by conditional use permits. Sapp asked that the Council deny Bill No. 5076.

Beverly Lofton, St. Charles County resident, stated the plans for the proposed development were very unclear and nearby residents are very concerned with increased noise, traffic, and light pollution. Lofton stated Green's Bottom Road, with deep ditches on either side, would be a dangerous access road and not allow for parking. Lofton stated the Bluffs subdivision presented an opposition letter to the Council and urged the Council to support the Planning and Zoning Commission who ruled against this rezoning 7 – 2.

Council Chair Schneider stated Councilman White would ask for the bill to be tabled, as the applicant has requested more time to address neighbor's concerns.

Decorum

Aimee Robertson – O'Fallon resident, addressed the devolving civility and decorum at Council meetings and stated one group is overtaking the council meetings with rude and intimidating behavior. Robertson stated she and Councilman Brazil have had kind conversations outside of the meetings and urged kindness when dealing with differences. Robertson discouraged the angry rallies before council meetings. Robertson urged the Council to take control of the meetings so that they are safe and welcoming to all who would like to speak.

Councilman Brazil clarified that his opinions are passionate not angry.

General Grievances

Jen Olson – Wentzville resident, thanked Councilman Brazil for standing with the people and stated citizens don't have confidence in the electoral process because people have been replaced in the process by hackable machines. Olson questioned the Council's refusal to ask for an audit and acknowledged the Election Authority could deny the request. Olson stated our free country is at stake, our Constitution has been destroyed, and government has become unapologetically tyrannical. Olson urged an elections audit, paper ballots, hand tabulation, and free, fair and understandable election processes.

Mary Ann Boatright – St. Peters resident, urged citizens to demand an audit of the April election, call for removal of electronic voting machines and poll pads and ask for paper ballots. Boatright urged the Council to deny multiple bills on the agenda that undermine our sovereignty. Boatright called for citizen engagement to preserve our Republic and vote out elected officials who are just standing by while our County is destroyed.

Judith Moorefield – St. Charles County resident, stated each issue has two sides and both can't be right. Moorefield urged the Council to wonder about the evidence presented supporting COVID vaccine deaths and election fraud, and not to work against the questions raised by constituents at council meetings. Moorefield requested the Council defend the Constitution and ask for an audit of the April election.

Dan White – St. Louis resident and volunteer with MO Canvassers, stated that while verifying voter records for the County’s April Municipal election, his group found 280 voting issues with 27 lost votes(non-recorded). White urged an investigation of lost votes and noted only 4 votes were recorded for 9 councilmembers and the County Executive in the April 5, 2022, election.

Laurie Nicewaner – Lake St. Louis resident, stated she supports the Police and notices their sacrifices but was concerned that the Police didn’t intervene after attacks/threats by Councilman Cronin to Arnie Dienoff after a council meeting. Nicewaner questioned if the Council is covering up election fraud and corrupt behavior.

Amber Crawford – St. Charles County resident, stated that Unison voting equipment is cyber vulnerable, owned by a company based in Malaysia, and connected to the internet. Crawford played an inaudible tape on election fraud.

Arnie Dienoff – O’Fallon resident – requested a police investigation for a threat to him by Councilman Cronin after a council meeting. Dienoff questioned why and how much the County pays CALEA, he questioned county spending, corrected a prior comment about Councilmember Cronin’s mother’s voting history and suggested more supervision of the Port Authority.

Councilman Cronin made a motion to take up the following items removed from the May 31, 2022, council meeting for discussion. The motion was seconded by Councilman Hollander with all in favor.

Councilman Brazil preceded this with discussion of the two current consent items most recently removed:

Councilman Brazil requested clarification on the IS license renewal to which Matthew Seeds, Director of Information Systems, responded that the cost covered 1260 user emails, MS Office products and the annual cost for approximately 200 County server licenses.

Councilman Hammond motioned to approve this item, seconded by Councilman Brazil with all in favor. The following item was approved:

Councilman Brazil requested clarification on a Comprehensive Health Care Plan for the Adult Justice Center from Dan Keen, the Director of Corrections, who explained the plan would eliminate the need for prior contract costs. Councilman Cronin added the plan addresses problems in the present employment environment and provides indemnity for the county against unforeseen legal expenses. Council Chair Schneider noted the plan covers services that are required by law.

Councilman Hollander motioned to approve this item, seconded by Councilman Hammond with all in favor. The following item was approved:

Councilman Cronin stated his procedural concerns with the Energy Conservation Projects had been addressed and would approve the consent item.

Councilman Brazil explained his cost concerns with the Park at New Melle Lakes and Timber Barn at Matson Hill had been addressed, they were legitimate costs and he would approve the consent items.

Councilman Hammond suggested the Parks Department consult with the Building Department when problems arise as they did with the Timber Barn design.

Regarding the Facilities change order to the Energy Conservation Project, Councilman Brazil explained this covered deferred maintenance due to COVID, he verified the mechanical contractors were local and union and was comfortable with the bid as it locks in prices.

Frisz stated RIIC helps with crimes in progress like tracking license plates, adds to officer safety, and increases arrests. Frisz explained this agreement would not turn over our Police Department to St. Louis County. The County Executive explained the County loses no control over our Police Department by participation in RIIC.

Councilman White motioned to table Bill No. 5076 to allow the applicant time to explain his request to the neighbors, seconded by Councilman Brazil with all in favor. Bill No. 5076 was tabled.

Councilman Cronin requested the applicant provide clearer uses for his proposed plan.

Bill No. 5077 - Sponsored by Joe Cronin - AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF COOPERATION AGREEMENTS WITH VARIOUS CITIES TO SUPPORT AN APPLICATION BY ST. CHARLES COUNTY TO THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT FOR QUALIFICATION AS AN “URBAN COUNTY” UNDER THE DEPARTMENT’S COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAMS

Michael Hurlbert, Director of Community Development, explained the “Urban County” is a collection of local governments and St. Charles County to receive \$1 million in block grant funds from HUD, for social service programs to assist low-income homeowners and the elderly with transportation, rent and home maintenance. Hurlbert explained the funds do not subsidizing new apartment buildings. Discussion was held concerning the increased building of apartment complexes.

Bill No. 5078 - Sponsored by John White - AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING ST. CHARLES COUNTY MATCHING FUNDS AS REQUIRED BY THE STATE OF MISSOURI TO UTILIZE FUNDING FROM SCS HCS HB 3020, SECTION 20.881 THE CORONAVIRUS STATE FISCAL RECOVERY – WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FUND FOR ASSISTANCE WITH DRAINAGE AND EROSION ISSUES, AND SUBSIDENCE IN THE HERITAGE SUBDIVISION IN ST. CHARLES COUNTY AND APPROVING EXECUTION OF ANY NECESSARY AGREEMENTS

Councilman White thanked County Executive Ehlmann and State Representative Christofanelli for making the funds available. Ehlmann clarified the lawyers found the path to the funds. Ehlmann noted the bill to approve the funding is still awaiting the Governor’s signature. Councilman Cronin suggested this was a temporary fix for drainage infrastructure and recommended working on a Drainage District for a long-term fix. Discussion was held concerning covering the growing costs of maintaining drainage infrastructure.

Bill No. 5079 - Sponsored by Council as a Whole - AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF FRANCIS HOWELL, ORCHARD FARM, FORT ZUMWALT, WASHINGTON AND WENTZVILLE TO PLACE SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS LOCATED IN THE UNINCORPORATED AREA OF ST.
