Definition of MACTAC

Multi-Assault, Counter Terrorism Action Capabilities

This course is **designed to train first responders in proper tactics and techniques when responding to an active shooter event.** How to park upon arrival, vital equipment, and traveling and bounding to the building are all demonstrated.



Why MACTAC?

- Incidents are spontaneous
- Suspects are unpredictable and heavily armed
- Incidents involve large victim environments
- First responders were outgunned
- First responders were not sufficiently trained
- Tactical (SWAT) intervention too late to be effective
- Multi-jurisdictional issues evident



Purpose

Make clear the mission of an active shooter deployment, which is:

- Swift and aggressive response
- Minimize the number of victims
- Stop the assault
- Limit suspect movement and or prevent escape
- Neutralize the threat



Who Gets Trained?

Like our St. Louis County counterparts, we trained approximately 650 commissioned responders within the St. Charles County Region. Each officer receives an intense 10-hour block of active shooter response and tactics. Refresher training is also available through Virtual Academy.

This training teaches officers from any agency to respond swiftly and affectively to resolve each threat accordingly.



4E School Training

- 4E (Educate, Escape, Evade and Engage) Swift and aggressive response (Run, Hide and Fight)
- PowerPoint followed by scenarios and “stop the bleed” training
- All school staff are given this 4-hour instruction



Inside Movements

Hallway Movement (Explain and Demonstrate)

1. Officer (Kill Mission – Student Reps)
2. Officer (Kill Mission – Student Reps)
3. Officers (Same as 2 w/ RG-Student Reps)
- 4/5 Officers (TIGHT “Diamond”-Student Reps)

Hallway Movement with Limited Entry

- 4&5 Contact Team Entry, No Threshold Penetration,
- Pinch Hamstring, (Do not show room clearing yet, just 2/3
- steps into room)
